

Join us for a fall celebration in the tradition of old-time county fairs with all-around family fun for the whole family.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 24

e will celebrate all that is good about an old-fashioned country fair with activities that include living history demonstrations of open hearth cooking, spinning, weaving, wood turning, blacksmithing and there will be livestock with cows, chickens, and goats.

Popular activities include historical games like **Farmer in the Cove** and the **Ladies Skillet Throw**. Farmer in the Cove



is a hands-on experience for children to learn the chores of a typical farm family in the 19th century. Some of the 'chores' include picking apples, gathering eggs, sweeping the cabin porch, doing laundry by hand, corn shelling, and planting crops.

The **Townsend Artisan Guild** will offer art activities for children

- no art skills are necessary and the children can take their creations home as a souvenir.


Junior Appalachian Musicians® Smoky Mountain

You'll see weaving, wood turning, blacksmithing and there will be livestock with cows, chickens, and goats.



CABIN FEVER REIGNS

The **Great Smoky Mountains Heritage**

Center continues to promote the responsible restoration of Appalachian cabins and buildings where visitors and patrons can connect with the spirit and history of the past. These priceless artifacts provide the perfect setting for educational demonstrations of historic Appalachian culture and lifestyle.



HISTORY ON DISPLAY

SETOFF HOUSE

Although there are questions regarding its original purpose, this structure was once owned by the Little River Lumber Company. It is currently interpreted as a railroad "setoff" house with the interior designed according to the memories of someone who lived in such a house as a child. So, what is a setoff house? Quite simply, it was a one-

room shack that could be picked up or dropped off a railroad flatcar by use of a crane. Typically "set off" the flatcar in rows along the railroad tracks, this type of housing for railroad workers was uncomfortable, noisy, and often dangerous. This is just one of the historic structures you can see in the Heritage Center's historic village!






CARDWELL CABIN ORGAN

Back home again! We've talked a lot about the Cardwell Cabin lately, largely because that structure is so important to our living history demonstrations. However, its significance is enhanced by the fact that many Cardwell descendants are still in the area. They pass along stories, memories, and occasionally even artifacts we can use to better interpret the home. The organ shown here is one example. The Cardwells

purchased this small organ around 1910, and it illustrates that residents of the Smoky Mountain region weren't quite as isolated during the late 19th and early 20th centuries as many think. They had access to mail order catalogs and could travel to nearby cities to pick up items they needed. Although the home and the organ have been separated for quite some time, we're pleased to have them together again!

HEIRLOOM GARDEN

During the Summer of 2022, the Heritage Center celebrated "Mornings in the Garden" on selected Tuesdays and Saturdays, the **Tuckaleechee** Garden Club offered tours and guidance about heirloom vegetables, traditional herbs, and edible flowers.









Adjacent to the garden is a new Heirloom Apple Orchard. With varieties such as William's Favorite and the Aunt Rachel, we will have 16 total trees, all of which have a rich history among the families of the Smoky Mountain region. The mission of the Garden Club club is to promote education and interest to add beauty and charm to our homes and communities. We appreciate their on-going contribution to these new Heritage Center assets.

DAVIS CABIN COMPLETE

It's a happy day at the Heritage Center as the exterior of the **Davis Cabin** is complete! We will take care of the remaining interior details over the next couple of weeks, and then we'll be ready for a dedication.



◀ B&C Masonry, did an amazing job on the Davis Cabin chimney and fireplace! Except for the firebrick inside, the fireplace and hearth were constructed using only the 200-year-old brick salvaged from the original structure. The masons mimicked the crudity of the original joint work!


CHEROKEE SYLLABARY

Many thanks to our friends at Sequoyah Birthplace Museum for providing copies of the Cherokee Syllabary!

These copies were printed using a circa-1830s Acorn printing press similar to the one used to create the original Cherokee Phoenix. If you

look at the center portion of the syllabary, you'll see the Cherokee translation of "Great Smoky Mountain Heritage Center."

The framed copy you see here will soon be added to our main gallery at the Heritage Center.



The Cherokee syllabary was invented by Sequoyah in the late 1810s and early 1820s to write the Cherokee language. His creation of the syllabary is particularly noteworthy as he was illiterate until it's creation.

STORY CIRCLE SERIES

The Heritage Center hosted six Story Circle gatherings on Wednesdays this past July and August.

Our purpose was to record and preserve family stories, memories, and folklore from the various cultures of the Smoky Mountain region.

Participants shared family stories and local tall tales

that will be preserved in the archives of the Center for future generations. We discussed why these stories have been preserved in the community and their role in the cultures from which they originate.

This program was made possible by a Creative Aging Grant from the Tennessee Arts Commission.



CADES COVE HERITAGE TOURS

Our 14-passenger Guided bus tours are offered on most Tuesdays & Thursdays until October 27.

Take a seat with a seasoned driverguide who will offer historical tidbits on the history of Cades Cove and the families that lived there. You may see bears, deer, and other wildlife on



the tour. Tours begin at 9:00 am and return between 12:00 to 1:00 pm.



Sam Venable, noted humorist, naturalist and writer, will lead fall tours to Newfound Gap, Sugarlands, and Elkmont on September 29, October 8, October 21, and October 29, 2022. You will experience the history and magnificent

fall foliage of the Smokies. These tours

are \$90 per person and include a boxed lunch. The tour lasts from 9:30 am until about 2:00 pm.

HISTORY ON DISPLAY

10,000 YEARS AGO...

This state historical marker on Highway 321 in Townsend describes (in part) the genesis of the Heritage Center. A road-widening project in 1999

led to the discovery of thousands upon thousands of Native American artifacts in the vicinity of the Tuckaleechee Villages.



This discovery gave birth to the concept

of a Heritage Center, a place where the human history of the Smokies could be collected, preserved, and shared. Many of the priceless artifacts from The Townsend Dig - or "Big Dig," - can be viewed at the Center.

Stop in and see how the earliest settlers lived in and around the Smokies!

The Heritage Center has lots of settler history, but it also has a permanent exhibit dedicated to the Native Americans of East Tennessee, the first settlers here.
